Best Romance Novels

(from the genre as it arose in the 20th century) provided by Linda and Best Lists

(There is a debate over which of these first two are the best romance novel)

<u>Dream Man</u> by Linda Howard (Contemporary)

A psychic sees a vision & goes to the police to report it only to face a cop who, while attracted to her, doesn't trust her. Some great lines I will never forget.

Outlander by Diana Gabaldon (Historical)

Meant to be a historical novel the publisher told the author it would sell bigger as a romance. This is a great story about a woman who goes back to 1740s and the Scottish uprising. This book was intended as a historical novel and it is longer than most romance works.

A Knight in Shining Armor by Jude Deveraux (Contemporary & Historical)

A visitor to England is left in a cemetery by her lover & her tears bring a surprising rescuer.

It Had to be You by Susan Elizabeth Phillips (Contemporary)

This book and the next one are part of a serious about sports stars. In this one a brilliant scientist wants a baby but not by a smart father (she grew up odd & way ahead at school) & picks a football player as the dad.

Nobody's Baby but Mine by Susan Elizabeth Phillips (Contemporary)

A tear jerker about the widow of an evangelical minister who cheated his congregation - she is thought to be a money grabber. She meets a broken man - the rest isn't new but very well done.

Mine Til Midnight by Lisa Kleypas (the Hathaway Series # 1) (Regency)

Kelypas is a local author and her Regency novels are wonderful. This one is about a poor family whose oldest brother becomes an Earl. 1^{st} book is about the eldest sister & the Gypsy gambler followed by books about all the siblings, something done a lot in romance.

<u>Sea Swept</u> by Nora Roberts (Chesapeake Series # 1) (Contemporary)

Roberts writes a lot of 3-4 book series and this first one was one of her best.

Almost any Regency novel by Mary Balogh

Mary Balogh is Welsh, I believe, and I have rarely been disappointed in her books.

Son of the Morning by Linda Howard (very different) (Contemporary & Historical)

This Howard book is very different: a scholar sees a crime & is on the run. She experiences great changes & her research into medieval manuscripts has surprising results.

Flowers from the Storm by Laura Kinsale (long considered the best -1992) (Historical)

<u>Morning Glory</u> by LaVyrie Spencer (she writes very different romances) Early 20th century)

Set at the beginning of WWII this book shows Spencer's unique take on romance. The hero is an ordinary man except he was in prison and the heroine is a single mother with children.



<u>Family Blessings</u> by LaVyrie Spencer (a May December romance turned on its head)

I love this odd book: a woman's son is killed (he's a policeman) and she finds his best friend the only person she can be open with. Their friendship grows into something else.

<u>Cry No More</u> by Linda Howard (Contemporary)

A mother's baby is taken from her while she is shopping in an open air Mexican market. Her desperation & grief turn into a movement to help find lost children.

<u>Heaven Texas</u> by Susan Elizabeth Phillips (Contemporary)

This sports centered book has a golfer & an English visitor who wants to ruin herself so she won't have to marry the man she dislikes back in English.

Almost Heaven by Judith McNaught (Regency)

<u>Diamond Bay/Midnight Rainbow</u> by Linda Howard (I like the 1st one best - Contemp)

For awhile there were a lot of romances about couples on the run. Midnight is one of them but Diamond Bay is a little different. I read it first and loved it: a woman finds a man's body in the water & rescues him.

Night Play (Dark Hunter series) by Sherrilyn Kenyon (Paranormal)

Crazy for You by Jennifer Crusie (Contemporary)

Sugar Daddy by Lisa Kleypas (Contemporary)

A contemporary about a poor, trailer trash heroine who finds a savior in an old man. Heroine is a treat & misunderstood, a romance theme.

Goddess of Spring by P.C. Cast (Paranormal)

Naked in Death by J.D. Robb (futurist police romance by Nora Roberts)

First in a long running series ('In Death' in all titles), best to start with this one. Eve Dallas is a determined and dedicated police woman in 2060's & her first suspect is Roarke, a wealthy Irish American. There are more than 25 in the series and the murders are often gruesome but you can get hooked.
