WHY I JOINED AAUW BY BUNNY HEINER

Although I had heard of AAUW before moving to Anacortes 20 years ago, I did not realize it was an organization for all women college graduates and thought it was for teachers only. Shortly after moving here, Sue Hill, the cousin of a good friend who was then a local branch member, invited me to my first meeting. I was so impressed with the speaker that I went to the next meeting, at which time I joined our branch.

A few months later, our president, Sarah Bronte Eckstein, left for a round-the-world cruise and I was chosen to fill the remainder of her term. I was then elected to two terms as president. Right from the start, I was thus a very involved member of our wonderful AAUW branch and I continue to be quite involved. Over the years, I have chaired several fund-raisers and been chair and/or a member of a number of committees, including bylaws, hospitality, nominating, newsletter, publicity, and ten years on the scholarship committee. For six years, our branch hosted a lecture series, with up to six lectures

annually; our largest audience was 200 people. The lectures series "morphed" into the Writers Forum, which I chaired three times.

While president, I went annually to the state convention and it was there that I was privileged to hear speakers who had received grants and scholarships given at the national level, including speakers who had received help from the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF), which made me a big fan of this program. Since LAF is one of the few national programs our branch is involved in, I have been very pleased to help with and/or host our annual LAF barbeque for several years.

The reason I joined AAUW was the monthly programs, which I personally consider the strength of our branch. I think of them as a continuing education series. It is these excellent programs – and all the wonderful women in our branch who have become friends and who do so much for our community – which keeps me involved.

In addition to AAUW, I have been involved with several arts organizations since moving to Skagit County. I have a passion for reading, gardening, and entertaining. When Lonny and I moved into our current home we were shocked to realize that we have about 8,000 books! Lonny and I have two sons, each of whom has a son and daughter.
