# TAKE A BOW! AAUW gave away \$4000.00 in scholarships this year. The process begins

with wide application distribution in January. The AAUW Scholarship goes to women who are entering or completing an undergraduate degree program, a vocational certification program, or taking courses beyond the undergraduate level in preparation for an advanced degree and are an Anacortes High School Graduate or have resided on Fidalgo Island or Guemes Island for the last three years.

Along with transcripts and a resume of awards, work experience and extracurricular activities, the application requires 3 personal references and two essay questions:

- 1. Aims and Goals: What is your proposed field of study? How will this scholarship help you? Explain any special circumstances, including financial, that have influenced your educational plans.
- 2. As a citizen, what do you consider to be your responsibilities to your home, your community, and the world?

Seventeen complete applications were received this year. Six came from graduating Anacortes High School seniors and eleven were from returning or continuing undergraduates or graduate students. The Scholarship Committee agonized over narrowing the field to seven. Every applicant is accomplished and needs financial support. The 7 interviewees are asked these questions

- 1. Tell us about a challenge or problem you have successfully overcome in your life.
- 2. Who has been an influential role model or mentor, and how have they influenced you?
- 3. What obstacles do you foresee as you work towards completion of your degree, and what will you do to overcome them?
- 4. Tell us about your favorite book.
- 5. Where do you see yourself in 10 years?
- 6. Is there anything else that you want us to know and remember about you before you leave today?
- 7. Do you have any questions for us about the remainder of the scholarship process?

# Did you know?

Since its first meeting in 1881, AAUW has been a catalyst for change. Our nonpartisan, nonprofit organization has more than 170,000 members and supporters across the United States, as well as 1,000 local branches and over 800 college and university partners. Throughout our history, AAUW members have examined and taken positions on the fundamental issues of the day — educational, social, economic, and political.

Marie Curie, a future Nobel Prize-winning scientist, received contributions from American women toward the purchase of one gram of radium in order to continue her research. Curie's daughter later returned a portion of unused money to AAUW, which used it to create the endowment that funds the Marie Curie Postdoctoral Fellowship.

#### Empowering women and girls since 1881 Message from the Presidents:

The Anacortes Branch has had a great year! 64 members (for our 'workforce' and funding for many AAUW programs), monthly meetings with good speakers (for our brains and social interests) and good workers (manning the membership table at Saturday Market, helping LWV at 'Meet the Candidates' events, working hard on the Scholarship Event, setting up for the Writers' Forum, updating Bylaws (yup, we did that this year), keeping track of donations (Funds: #3999 for LAF and #4371 for Tech Trek). A marketing specialist gave us suggestions on how to 'upgrade' our Branch (and we need to incorporate some more of her ideas).

We made \$4000 from the Spring Fundraiser – how great! And over \$500 from the August BBQ for LAF (named in memory of Ann Nord) .And \$6,000 via donations from the Branch and from businesses in the community to the Tech Trek fund in order to send six girls to a week-long STEM camp in July (which research shows is very helpful in keeping middle school girls interested in and continuing on in STEM subjects).

This summer after the Board retreat, we would like to have some very casual social events – coffees for the New Members or others who would like to learn more about AAUW and about our Branch; a field trip or two (the last time I took the ferry was to the San Juan lavender fields with Branch members) AND (new) Internet sessions to explore the AAUW National website and their Programs in a Box, AAUW YouTube videos and projects from other Branches.

The Board retreat will be Thursday, June 12<sup>th</sup> from 4:00 – 9:00 PM at Letty Hafer's home. At that time the Branch will set the schedule for the 2014-15 fiscal year.

**Here's where you come in:** At the retreat we have an Idea Circle and anything not on the agenda that pops into our heads or that we've been thinking about will be considered or discussed. We've gotten some great ideas in the past and we are hoping for more this year. *What do you think?* What made you join? What makes you stay? Do you want more social activities? (what kind? with or without spouses/SOs?); an extra speaker in April? (the usual 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday with the fundraiser being later in the month) And what kind of speakers would you like to hear (local issues, state issues, general knowledge, anything is fine; women's issues; any particular topics – this is the time to give us names and contact information for the future); would you like the speakers to have longer presentations? (now we aim for 30 minutes or so); what else is on your mind?

### Why I joined AAUW...

**Rosette:** I've belonged to AAUW since 1971. (The impetus arose from my experiences working in STEM fields). I was active in a branch in Northwest Houston (Texas) for 5 years and chaired our Environmental Special Interest Group which garnered speakers once a month – these meetings took place in member homes. When my husband was transferred to Illinois, we lived in St Louis and I became a member-at-large (belonging to National only) which meant I had access to the research and data coming from National but didn't 'have to' volunteer for anything in a Branch (you know how we are...). I finally became a Life Member of National in 1976 because I figured I'd live a long time and it would be cheaper. When we retired and moved to Anacortes I sought out a Branch because I needed a few Scrabble players (surely there would be plentiful English majors that liked this). And then... I got hooked on State Conventions and the inspired and inspiring working to provide scholarships and awards for local girls. Why do I stay? Because our job is not done... until more than 3% of CEOs (Fortune 500) are women, until 50% of women are engineers and in technology (we are about 18% now), until equal pay (we are still around 77% on average) and advancement for equal work and talent are the norm... well, I'll just have to keep on working.

LINDA: I joined the Anacortes Branch of AAUW in 1976 or 1977. I didn't know AAUW but as the assistant librarian at

the Anacortes Public Library I felt it would be good to belong to one of the city's organizations. AAUW was suggested and it seemed a good option. At that time the branch was small, fewer than 20 members, if I remember correctly. Marge Stitt was president and she was wonderful in that position. I remember her saying that 'you don't ask for volunteers, you tell them you have chosen them for a job and that is that' but of course she was Marge Stitt so everyone said yes to her. We met in individuals' homes, our programs were often home grown (members would pick a topic, research it and then present it - my first was on nutrition: its history in the U.S.), and we had an annual pancake breakfast! I stayed in AAUW because of the wonderful people and the programs which were varied - I could depend on learning and broadening my world through them. We moved from meeting in individuals' homes to meeting rooms: the Harbor House, the United Methodist Church and now our current home, Westminster Presbyterian. I started doing a Book Talk in 1978 or 1979 presenting books I had read in the last year. The first time members told about books was on Science Fiction and I passed out books from my personal library. That worked so well we moved on to topics. When I wasn't active the Book Talk remained on the calendar so I kept my membership and am so glad I did. Organizing the Writers' Forum has been challenging and fulfilling - meeting the wonderful authors who presented was special. Members come and members go but the heart of our branch stays the same: a dedication to learning, supporting women & girls and community.
