At our January Book Talk meeting, the topic is True Crime. An article from Wikipedia explains what defines a book as true crime. Hopefully you will find one that interests you. If you have any questions, contact Linda Hendrick at 360-293-6518.

From Wikipedia: True crime books often center on sensational, shocking, or strange events, particularly murder. Even though murder makes up less than 20% of reported crime, it is present in most true crime stories. Typically, these books report on a crime from the beginning of its investigation to its <u>legal proceedings</u>. Serial killers have been a highly profitable sub-genre. An informal survey conducted by <u>Publishers Weekly</u> in 1993 concluded that the more popular true crime books focus on serial killers, with the more gruesome and grotesque content

Some true crime works are "instant books" produced quickly to capitalize on popular demand; these have been described as "more than formulaic" and hyper-conventional. Others may reflect years of thoughtful research and inquiry and may have considerable <u>literary merit</u>.

A milestone of the genre was <u>Norman Mailer</u>'s <u>*The Executioner's Song*</u> (1979), which was the first book in the genre to win a <u>Pulitzer Prize</u>.

Other prominent true crime accounts include <u>Truman Capote</u>'s <u>In Cold Blood</u>;^[9] the best-selling true crime book of all time <u>Helter Skelter</u>, by the lead <u>Manson family</u> prosecutor <u>Vincent Bugliosi</u> and <u>Curt</u> <u>Gentry</u>; and <u>Ann Rule</u>'s <u>The Stranger Beside Me</u>, about <u>Ted Bundy</u>. An example of a modern true crime book is <u>I'll Be Gone in the Dark</u> by <u>Michelle McNamara</u>.

In 2006, <u>Associated Content</u> stated that since the start of the <u>21st century</u>, the genre of writing that was growing the quickest was true crime. Much of this is due to the ease of recycling materials and the publication of numerous volumes by the same authors differing only by minor updates. The majority of readers of true crime books are women.
