Tech Trek growth in Washington has been phenomenal! since 2013, Twenty-two of AAUW-WA's 34 branches selected 188 campers to attend in 2019. Combined with numbers from 2013 through 2018, a total of almost 1,000

girls in Washington have been served by this program in its first seven years of existence. Over \$1,000,000 has been raised within AAUW Washington to support this program.

Due to the coronavirus pandemic, the 2020 camps were canceled nationwide. AAUW Washington will have three weeks of camps at two sites in 2021 — two weeks at Pacific Lutheran University and one week at Eastern Washington University.

Branches will be contacting local 7th grade STEM teachers this fall, seeking recommendations for potential campers.

All campers must have a recommendation from a STEM teacher (preferably both math and science), complete the Tech Trek application form (including writing an essay) and be interviewed by local AAUW branch members. Families are expected to provide transportation for their daughter to/from camp and are asked to pay a \$50 family fee. The remaining cost — estimated at \$1,000 per camper for 202 — is covered by AAUW-WA fundraising efforts at both the branch and state level.

The AAUW-WA Tech Trek team is continuing to plan Tech Trek camps in 2021. Our preference is to hold in-person camps, including a make-up session for the 2020 chosen campers.

At this early date, we feel it prudent with our current resources and level of uncertainty with the pandemic, to **think** about a face-to-face camp but **plan** a **virtual** camp for at least the 2020 campers.

Soon after the new year, we will provide further guidance to the state-wide Tech Trek community regarding more detailed 2021 summer plans and IF 2021 camp recruitment should be considered.

Tech Trek WA 2021

Tech Trek is a premier camp offering STEM education to girls. Residential campers not only enjoy college dorm life and cafeteria dining but also delve into a wide range of core STEM subjects. These core studies involve 12 hours of hands-on learning supported by 12 additional self-selected mini, rotating labs for exploring individual specialties. Class subjects can include astronomy, chemistry, cyber security, marine biology, and robotics, while mini-labs may dive into activities relating to marine bivalves, diagnosing computer hackers, using a stethoscope, and calculating the trajectory of foot pump rockets. All camps include a Professional Women's night in which girls meet and interact with local women working in STEM careers. Additionally, camps provide a field trip experience with STEM learning, an inspiring movie night, and many chances to team build with their fellow campers and high school student counselors.
