

Many thanks to our Scholarship Committee for their work this spring ~ Barbara Benson, Nelle Jacobson, Terri Bawden, Cordelia Hightower, Polly Myers, and Sandy Norris. They received 14



applications for scholarship and felt that all of the candidates were worthy of support. Unfortunately, we were bound by our \$5500 budget and the committee had to narrow the interviews to the top four women. Here are the candidates they selected.

**April Davis** is a 19-year-old from Anacortes, Washington. She is



currently attending Western Washington University, with plans to obtain a Bachelor of Science in Kinesiology. Her ultimate goal is

to obtain a master's degree and become a certified Physician

Assistant. She enjoys running, hiking, reading, and playing guitar in her free time. (\$2000 scholarship)

Elizabeth Braatz is currently a student at Western Oregon
University, majoring in criminal justice, with a minor in legal studies.
She was adopted as an infant in San Diego, California and moved to Anacortes, Washington when she started Sixth Grade. She was diagnosed with a learning disability as a child, but with hard work and help from her family, tutors, teachers and counselors, she has been able to overcome her disability and succeed.



At Anacortes High School, Elizabeth was a four-year Varsity swimmer, an active member of Key Club and National Honor Society, received the Band Spirit Award for a graduating senior with the AHS Band, and was a founding member of the AHS Activist Student Union and the Volunteerism Club. In 2018, she earned her Varsity letter in Volunteerism and was a co-recipient of the Student Volunteer-of-the-Year Award for her community service activities.

After racist incidents at Western Oregon University, Elizabeth organized a March Against Hate from WOU to downtown Monmouth, Oregon. She has been very active in student government at WOU, serving as Vice President of her dorm, Vice President of the Residential Housing Association, and Vice President of the Black Student Union. She is currently a Senator with the Associated Students of WOU and was recently elected Senate President for the 2021-2022 school year. Elizabeth is an active member of WOU's Multicultural Student Union and LGBTQ+ and BIPOC affinity groups, she participated in Get-Out-the-Vote campaigns with Basic Rights Oregon, and has testified at the Oregon State Legislature on issues affecting college students. Her awards include Outstanding

RHA Member, Outstanding BSU Member, and Outstanding ASWOU Senator. In May 2021, Elizabeth became the first third-year student to receive WOU's prestigious Klush Tom Tom ("Individual Who Has a Heart for People") Award, which is usually awarded to a graduating senior.

After completing her degree in Criminal Justice, Elizabeth plans to go to law school, then become a civil rights attorney. She wants to work for a government agency that fights civil rights issues discrimination. After gaining experience as an attorney, Elizabeth may enter politics so she can continue to advocate for equitable systems and policies. (\$1000 scholarship)

**Erin Wolfswinkel** has spent most of her life in Anacortes, except for a small stint in Colorado where she and her husband started their small family. An avid gardener and plant lover, after graduating from Anacortes High School, Erin went on to complete her BA in Environmental

(\$1500 scholarship)

Horticulture from the University of Washington. Erin has been a Paraprofessional at Island View Elementary for 5 years and began pursuing her Master's in Elementary Education through Western Governor's University in January. Erin is thankful for the support provided through the AAUW scholarship. (\$1000 scholarship)

Sophie Riley is a rising second-year student at the University of San Diego. She plans to accomplish a Bachelor's degree in biology with a minor in English. She plans to attend medical school and eventually work with children as a pediatrician. Sophie works at Fidalgo Animal Medical Center and volunteers with Children's House International

Adoptions. For fun she spends time with her family and friends, participates

at the Dancing Camel Yoga studio in Anacortes, and reads books, her favorite being *The Little Prince* by Antoine de St. Exupery. Sophie is the oldest of four adopted children, and some of her greatest mentors have been her mother, Cynthia Riley, and Spanish teacher, Amy Ubungen. Sophie is a graduate from Anacortes High School and hopes to make her family and community proud.





Réanne joined the Anacortes branch of AAUW in 2007 and held a BA degree in French from Pomona College and attended Claremont Graduate University and the University of Grenoble, France. We enjoyed hearing of her experiences as a sailor, writer, cyclist, and language teacher. Her best-selling book, Cape Horn: One Man's Dream, One Woman's Nightmare has been published in French and Italian and is now being translated into Spanish. She also authored the awarding-winning The Shelburne Escape Line - Secret Rescues of Allied Aviators by the French Underground, the British Royal Navy and London's MI-9, and the Tierra del Fuego cycling memoir, Two Women Against the Wind. #### Welcome: Bonnie Underwood

Bonnie welcomed our guest speaker and all the AAUW members, and the impressive number of interested guests from our community. She gave a brief history of AAUW in Anacortes and stated our Mission, which is to encourage continuing education of girls and women. AAUW gives annual scholarships to help women complete University degrees and also gives annual awards to 8<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> graders who have been selected for merit in STEM fields. This year the Awards were given in April and the Scholarships will be announced in June. AAUW also sponsors a program for elementary age girls called Tech Trek which is a summer program exposing these young girls to STEM careers in a University setting. AAUW has many fundraising activities to raise money for these monetary gifts.

#### Fundraising: Terri Bawden

We still have Tote Bags, which are available at the Market Grocery Store, and help sponsor our Scholarship Fund. A new fundraising event this year will be a "Merman Contest" in which the contestants will be displayed on a float in the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade and will also be pictured on Merman Calendars, which will be for sale and will commemorate this fun event. We hope to continue our Jingle Bell Dash in December, which also raises funds with entry fees.

<u>Guest Speaker</u>: Terri introduced Rakan Alduaij, a local photographer who has a large following of people who admire his beautiful pictures of our local scenery. Welcome, Rakan

Rakan began by stating that he was born in Kuwait and came to the United States when he was 21 years old. He moved to Anacortes in 2015 and was entranced with the beauty of this location with mountains, ocean, trees, and nice weather. Rakan shared some of his photos on the screen and he explained how he goes about capturing these images with his cameras. They were amazing pictures and the viewers had many questions for him at the end of his presentation.

#### AAUW Business Meeting: Bonnie Underwood

Minutes from the Annual Meeting in May of 2020. Bonnie read the minutes. Linda Hendrick
moved that the minutes be approved and Rosette Dawson seconded. The minutes were
approved as read.

#### <u>Election of new Officers</u>.

Bonnie explained that no new officers have agreed to fill the open positions on our board so most of the current Board members have agreed to serve for the coming year.  AAUW Branches disbanding. Bonnie announced that the AAUW Branches on Whidbey Island, Lake Washington and Wenatchee are disbanding because of lack of participation by their members. We have 40 members as of this past year, but tonight, only 16 of our members are participating in this meeting. Are we facing the same fate as our sister branches?

#### • <u>Publicity/Fundraising</u>: Terri Bowden

Terri was enthusiastic about the Merman Fundraising project. More than 10 Sponsors have been found and 6 others who have donated to our Fund. The 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade looks very promising as the Governor has declared that the Covid immunizations are going so well that we should be "fully open" by June 30. #### Scholarships: Barbara Benson

Barbara reported that the interviews to determine the scholarship awards will be held on Saturday, May 15. Four finalists have been selected from 14 applications. One will receive a \$2000 award and the other 3 will each receive \$1000 awards.

Patricia explained how the increase in dues by AAUW National will be handled and mentioned that the Vote for the By-Laws change will close on May 17.
