We have welcomed several new members. We have secured the library meeting room for our meetings and have several programs lined up for fall. What we still need is more volunteers. Here are some opportunities for you to consider.



Volunteers are needed to work at our booth at the Farmers Market on August 28 and September 11; we will need people to set up and close down as well as members to host the booth. We will be selling calendars and tote bags as well as encouraging new members to join us under the Shape the Future Campaign. Participants that join

under this program will receive 50% off of their national dues, but this offer is limited to the month we are hosting our booth at Farmers Market.



Volunteers are needed for the Nominating Committee. Several board members generously agreed to continue in their roles during the pandemic, however, this means that a significant number of positions will become open in the coming year. Our branch by-laws require a chair and committee of three to begin this work.

Committee members work with school staff for recommendations. Each year we host the Jingle Bell Dash to support this program.
