The first Tech Trek camp in Washington was offered in 2013. Initially it was held only at Pacific Lutheran University, but two years later an additional camp was hosted by Eastern Washington University. As the demand and enthusiasm for camp grew, a

second week of camp offered at PLU. Over 1,000 girls have been served by twenty-two AAUW Washington branches since the inception of Tech Trek. In 2020, in-person camp was canceled, however, a virtual camp was offered in 2021 to those girls as well as candidates selected in 2021. We are so grateful to local businesses in who support our mission to encourage young girls in science, technology, engineering and math. They include Shell Oil, Marathon Petroleum, Dakota Industries, Hexcel, EDCO, MicroAerodynamics, Underwood and Associates, Synergy Sports Technology, and Sturdy Engineering.

This year the cost of virtual camp included a box of materials and was about half the cost of sending a girl to camp. Because there are no longer any other branches of AAUW in Skagit County, our branch has been reaching out to middle schools, handling the paperwork, and sending girls from throughout the county. Interviews were done virtually, which made the process easier. Traditionally we invite the girls to share their experience at our October meeting along with parents and sponsors. Committee members are needed for Tech Trek. Contact Rosette Dawson if you would like to be a part of the interview process next year.

Most of the girls worked from home this year, but the LaConner School district opened their door to Tech Trek students and a teacher hosted the students in a classroom in order to provide the computer link to their on-line classes. Here are photos of some of the girls receiving their boxes.
