TECH TREK CAMP

Camp is designed around STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) to increase interest,



excitement and self-confidence in young women who will enter the eighth grade in the fall. It features hands-on learning and focusing on current hot topics for career exploration. Tech Trek introduces girls to local successful female STEM professionals, teaches girls that their intellectual skills will grow over time, and demonstrates that it is possible to break traditional female career stereotypes. Camp is located on a college campus using dorms, laboratories, recreation, and dining facilities. This camp model has operated in Washington for seven years and

approximately 1000 campers have attended the camp with 95% sponsorship from local AAUW branches. The program requires \$175,000 annually to operate and we are funded by individuals, companies, corporations, foundations, and service organizations. The Anacortes branch is so grateful to our local sponsors for making this possible for ten students in Skagit County.

In July the students selected for Tech Trek camp will attend Pacific Lutheran University for a week-long program. There will be two weeks of Tech Trek in Washington this summer at Pacific Lutheran University-Camp Dunbar – July 10-16 and Camp McClintock – July 17-23.



We look forward to hearing from them in the fall when they report to us about their camp experience.

The Anacortes School Foundation agreed with our committee's choices for scholarships for 2022-23. Our AAUW Treasurer, Patricia Griffith was an evaluator for ASF so we had an inside view of the process of awarding scholarships for local women. Five of our six top choices will be awarded scholarships. 



Ms. Rice gave an hour-long presentation of the NASA project to send a LandRover to Mars with the ultimate mission of collecting samples of Martian rocks to be analyzed for signs of life forms which may have been part of Martian history. Using some very detailed pictures of the successful trip to Mars and the landscape that was
