Join us for the first meeting of our AAUW calendar year on September 8, at 7:00 p.m. We are pleased to offer our program both **in-person** at the Anacortes Library meeting room and **on Zoom**. Our program speaker will be Gracie Ermi, a Research Engineer at the Allen Institute for Artificial Intelligence in Seattle, where she builds technology platforms to support wildlife research. Her work saves researchers' time in interpreting



and collecting data, so that they can work more efficiently. She's worked on projects related to sharks, elephants, killer whales and bottlenose dolphin. As an Ambassador for the American Association for the Advancement of Science IF/THEN Initiative, Gracie shares her work and her STEM story with audiences around the world. Gracie holds both a B.S. and a M.S. in computer science from Western Washington University, and when she is not writing code, she enjoys knitting and hiking in the incredible Pacific Northwest.

At the recent leadership planning meeting, the board voted to add a new component to our branch called "Friends of AAUW Anacortes." We believe this group of potential supporters will bring their time and talents to our committees and expand our volunteer base. There will

be no educational requirement and, although these supporters would be able to participate in and lead committees, they would not be able to hold an elected office. National is modifying the color palette for its logo, webpages etc. to meet ADA standards. More information will be made available in the next few weeks. Branches are not required to make the switch, but anything provided by National (website, etc.) will use the new red/black scheme.



ADA signage color contrast requirements state that signs must have a recommended **70% contrast** between the background color and characters or letters. This means that the signs can be in any color combination as long

as those two colors are light and dark and contrast each other by at least 70%. Should we consider changing our logo colors to meet this standard?

Long-time member and friend, Jane Crannell, passed away on July 14 at 101 years old. She joined AAUW in 1989 and shared her story with us at a meeting where we learned what a fascinating life she led. Jane taught three years in Pinellas County schools, then like many other educated girls wanting to help end WWII, she enlisted in the Marine Corps Women's Reserve and worked in Washington, DC as a Clerk-Typist. During her tenure there, she was fortunate to meet President Harry Truman, when she sang at the White House with a service quartet.

In 1946, her Marine, Murray Crannell, came back from the Pacific. They married and moved to New York's Adirondacks where they had two

children and lived in Hudson Falls, NY. Jane obtained her master's degree in teaching and taught fourth grade in Hudson Falls for twenty years.

Her favorite pastimes were gardening and riding trails on the couple's two blooded horses. Retirement brought many interesting miles of road trips throughout the U.S., Canada and Mexico.

After Murray's passing in 1987, Jane became a tutor for Literacy Volunteers of America and a construction volunteer for Habitat for Humanity. In later life, she moved to Anacortes, WA to be near her daughter who lives on Orcas Island. She enjoyed her contacts with the American Association of University Women, the Methodist Church and the Anacortes School District.
