
I feel this topic will generate conversation, stories about past jobs and experiences and a great list of books for us to read. I can't wait!



On October 11, Karen Dove, Executive Director of ANEW in Seattle, will speak on women's access to well-paying jobs in the building trades. ANEW provides quality training, including apprenticeships, and employment services to women and people from underserved communities in Washington.

On November 15, Kelly Jones of American University, will speak on her research on the economic consequences for women of restricted access to reproductive services. Professor Jones is an applied microeconomist whose research examines the effects of various economic policies on gender equality and women's economic wellbeing.

On December 13, State Senator Claire Wilson will speak on child care policies in Washington state. Her expertise on the topic comes from 25 years working as an early childhood education administrator and as a legislator working to develop new policies to improve childcare access. She will be joined by Sarah Brady, the policy and advocacy manager for Child Care Resources of King County.

Call to Order : 7:00 pm

Welcome: Bonnie Underwood welcomed everyone to the first AAUW hybrid meeting (in-person at the Library meeting room, and on Zoom). She said that there would be a regular business meeting after the speaker's presentation and asked all members to stay for that. Bonnie called on Gina Van Hess to introduce our guest speaker.

Gina introduced Gracie Ermi, who is a Research Engineer at the Allen Institute for Artificial Intelligence based in Seattle. She is currently working on using satellite mapping technology to analyze geographical variations in land use by measuring trees, snow and ice, water and buildings to see how land is being used now compared to previous uses. This research will help decision makers in planning for future climate change. She was formerly involved in working with environmentalists on wildlife conservation efforts. Her presentation concluded with some things that she wished she had learned in school in hopes of encouraging young students to become more involved with STEM fields.
